We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Independent School District No. 199, Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota (the District) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated October 19, 2015.

**INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING**

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and, therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. However, as described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs, we identified one deficiency in internal control that we consider to be a material weakness.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the District's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance. We consider the deficiency described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as item 2015-001 to be a material weakness.

## **COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the District's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

## **DISTRICT'S RESPONSE TO FINDING**

The District's response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. The District's response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

## **PURPOSE OF THIS REPORT**

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose.

**REPORT ON COMPLIANCE FOR EACH MAJOR FEDERAL PROGRAM**

We have audited Independent School District No. 199, Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota's (the District) compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133 *Compliance Supplement* that could have a direct and material effect on each of the District's major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2015. The District's major federal programs are identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs.

**MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSIBILITY**

Management is responsible for compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to its federal programs.

**AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITY**

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on compliance for each of the District's major federal programs based on our audit of the types of compliance requirements referred to above. We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and OMB Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*. Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the District's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion on compliance for each major federal program. However, our audit does not provide a legal determination of the District's compliance.

## **OPINION ON EACH MAJOR FEDERAL PROGRAM**

In our opinion, the District complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to on the previous page that could have a direct and material effect on each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2015.

## **REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER COMPLIANCE**

Management of the District is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above. In planning and performing our audit of compliance, we considered the District's internal control over compliance with the types of requirements that could have a direct and material effect on each major federal program to determine the auditing procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing an opinion on compliance for each major federal program and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with OMB Circular A-133, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over compliance.

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over compliance that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and, therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, we identified a deficiency in internal control over compliance, described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as item 2015-002, which we consider to be a significant deficiency.

## **DISTRICT'S RESPONSE TO FINDING**

The District's response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. The District's response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of compliance and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

The purpose of this report on internal control over compliance is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over compliance and the results of that testing based on the requirements of OMB Circular A-133. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose.

**MINNESOTA LEGAL COMPLIANCE**

Our audit included all of the listed categories.

In connection with our audit, nothing came to our attention that caused us to believe that the District failed to comply with the provisions of the *Minnesota Legal Compliance Audit Guide for Political Subdivisions*, except as described in the Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as item 2015-003. However, our audit was not directed primarily toward obtaining knowledge of such noncompliance. Accordingly, had we performed additional procedures, other matters may have come to our attention regarding the District's noncompliance with the above referenced provisions.

The District's response to the finding identified in our audit has been included in the Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. The District's response was not subject to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

**B. FINDINGS – FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT**

**MATERIAL WEAKNESSES IN INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING**

**2015-001 Segregation of Duties**

**Criteria** – Internal control over financial reporting.

**Condition** – Independent School District No. 199, Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota (the District) has limited segregation of duties in several areas, including the processing of general disbursements, payroll transactions, and journal entries.

**Questioned Costs** – Not applicable.

**Context** – This is a current year and prior year finding.

**Cause** – The limited segregation of duties is primarily caused by the limited size of the District's business office staff.

**Effect** – One important element of internal accounting controls is an adequate segregation of duties such that no individual has responsibility to execute a transaction, have physical access to the related assets, and have responsibility or authority to record the transaction. A lack of segregation of duties subjects the District to a higher risk that errors or fraud could occur and not be detected in a timely manner in the normal course of business.

**Recommendation** – We recommend that the District continue its efforts to segregate duties as best it can within the limits of what the District considers to be cost beneficial.

**Corrective Action Plan**

**Actions Planned** – The District will continue its efforts to segregate incompatible duties to the extent possible.

**Official Responsible** – The District's Director of Business Services.

**Planned Completion Date** – June 30, 2016.

**Disagreement With or Explanation of Finding** – The District agrees with the finding.

**Plan to Monitor** – The District's Director of Business Services will continue to review and improve segregation of duties at the District.

**SIGNIFICANT DEFICIENCY IN INTERNAL CONTROL OVER COMPLIANCE – U.S. DEPARTMENT OF  
AGRICULTURE CHILD NUTRITION CLUSTER – CFDA NOS. 10.553, 10.555, 10.556, AND 10.559**

**2015-002 Internal Control Over Compliance With Federal Procurement, Suspension, and  
Debarment Requirements**

**Criteria** – Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with requirements applicable to federal programs expenditures, including procurement, suspension, and debarment requirements applicable to the child nutrition cluster federal program.

**Condition** – During our audit, we noted that the District did not have sufficient controls in place within its child nutrition cluster federal program to assure that it was not contracting for goods or services with parties that are suspended or debarred from participating in contracts involving the expenditures of federal program funds. The District implemented additional control procedures in this area during fiscal 2015 in response to a prior year finding. However, the controls remained deficient, as the eligibility of two vendors providing over \$25,000 of goods or services to the District's child nutrition cluster were not verified.

**Questioned Costs** – None. Our testing did not indicate any instances of noncompliance.

**Context** – This is a current and prior year finding.

**Cause** – This was an oversight by district personnel.

**Effect** – Noncompliance with the procurement, suspension, and debarment requirements could result in the District expending federal funds with vendors that are not eligible to be parties to such transactions, which could be viewed as a violation of the award agreement.

**Recommendation** – We recommend that the District review its internal control procedures relating to procurement, suspension, and debarment for all federal programs. Internal controls over compliance for this area should include verification that any vendor with which the District contracts for goods or services exceeding \$25,000 is not listed as suspended or debarred on the federal Excluded Parties List System (EPLS) website.

**Corrective Action Plan**

**Actions Planned** – The District reviewed its procedures relating to procurement, suspension, and debarment for its federal programs, and will ensure that all parties with which it contracts for goods or services are eligible to participate in contracts involving the expenditures of federal program funding. The District properly completed this process for three of five vendors in the current year.

**Official Responsible** – The District's Director of Business Services.

**Planned Completion Date** – December 31, 2015.

**Corrective Action Plan (continued)**

Disagreement With or Explanation of Finding – The District agrees with the finding.

Plan to Monitor – The District’s Director of Business Services will assure appropriate controls are in place to verify that any vendor with which the District contracts for the child nutrition cluster federal program goods or services exceeding \$25,000 is not listed as suspended or debarred on the federal EPLS website.

**D. FINDINGS – MINNESOTA LEGAL COMPLIANCE AUDIT**

**2015-003 Claims and Disbursements**

**Criteria** – Minnesota Statute § 471.425, Subd. 2.

**Condition** – Minnesota Statutes require districts to pay each vendor obligation according to the terms of each contract or within 35 days after the receipt of the goods or services or the invoice for the goods or services. If such obligations are not paid within the appropriate time period, the District must pay interest on the unpaid obligations at the rate of 1.5 percent per month or part of a month. For three disbursements tested, the District did not pay the obligation within the required time period, and did not pay interest on the unpaid obligation.

**Questioned Costs** – Not applicable.

**Context** – Three of twenty-five disbursements tested were not in compliance. This is a current year and prior year finding.

**Cause** – All general disbursement invoices are paid through the district office. Invoices must be approved by the appropriate personnel at the school and/or department that received the goods or services prior to payment. On occasion, there is a timing delay in obtaining the necessary approval for payment and returning the invoice to the district office for payment.

**Effect** – Certain payments made to vendors were not paid within the timeframe as required by state statute, and the vendors were not paid interest to which they were entitled.

**Recommendation** – We recommend that the District review claims and disbursement payment procedures in place to ensure future compliance with this statute.

Disagreement With or Explanation of Finding – The District agrees with the finding.

Plan to Monitor – The District’s Director of Business Services will review the District’s procedures for paying invoices with the district employees responsible for processing disbursements and the employees who are making purchasing requests.

**E. SUMMARY SCHEDULE OF PRIOR AUDIT FINDINGS – MAJOR FEDERAL AWARD PROGRAMS AUDIT**

**2014-003 Significant Deficiency in Internal Control Over Compliance With Federal Procurement, Suspension, and Debarment Requirements**

**Finding** – Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with requirements applicable to federal programs expenditures, including procurement, suspension, and debarment requirements applicable to the child nutrition cluster federal programs. During our audit of the year ended June 30, 2014, we noted that the District did not have sufficient controls in place within its child nutrition cluster federal programs to assure that it was not contracting for goods or services with parties that are suspended or debarred, or whose principals are suspended or debarred from participating in contracts involving the expenditure of federal program funds.

**Recommendation** – We recommended that the District’s internal control procedures relating to procurement, suspension, and debarment for the child nutrition cluster federal programs include verification that any vendor with which the District contracts for goods or services exceeding \$25,000 is not listed as suspended or debarred on the federal EPLS website.

**Current Status** – The District implemented additional control procedures in this area during fiscal 2015 as recommended. However, the controls remained deficient, as the eligibility of two vendors providing over \$25,000 of goods or services to the District’s child nutrition cluster were not verified. See current year finding 2015-002.

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Independent School District No. 199, Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota (the District) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated October 19, 2015.

Audit standards referred to in the previous paragraph require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement. An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the District's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The accompanying Uniform Financial Accounting and Reporting Standards (UFARS) Compliance Table is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE), and is not a required part of the basic financial statements of the District. The UFARS Compliance Table is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the UFARS Compliance Table is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.
